

CCA Wins Two New Management Contracts and Maintains Management of One Existing Contract in Florida

NASHVILLE, TN, Apr 14, 2010 (MARKETWIRE via COMTEX) --CCA (Corrections Corporation of America) (NYSE: CXW), the nation's largest partnership corrections provider to government agencies, announced today that pursuant to a re-bid of the management contracts at four Florida facilities, two of which are currently managed by CCA, the Florida Department of Management Services ("Florida DMS") has indicated its intent to award CCA the continued management of the 985-bed Bay Correctional Facility, in Panama City, Florida. Additionally, the Florida DMS has indicated its intent to award CCA management of the 985-bed Moore Haven Correctional Facility in Moore Haven, Florida and the 1,884-bed Graceville Correctional Facility in Graceville, Florida. However, CCA was not selected for the continued management of the 1,520-bed Gadsden Correctional Facility in Quincy, Florida.

All of the facilities are owned by the state of Florida. The contracts which are subject to final negotiations contain an initial term of three-years and two 2-year renewal options. CCA expects to assume management of the Moore Haven and Graceville facilities, and to transition management at the Gadsden facility on August 1, 2010.

CCA expects to provide updated earnings guidance in its press release announcing financial results for the first quarter of 2010 expected to be released in May 2010.

Damon Hininger, president and CEO, stated, "We are pleased that Florida has again expressed a high level of confidence in our operations expertise by re-awarding CCA one of our existing contracts and entrusting us with two new contracts. Although we are disappointed that CCA was not selected for the continued management at Gadsden, we are grateful for the opportunity to expand our relationship with the State of Florida. CCA has been a trusted and accountable partner to the State of Florida for 15 years and we look forward to continuing our partnership. We will work closely with the Florida DMS and the current operator to ensure a smooth management transition."

CCA is the nation's largest owner and operator of partnership correction and detention facilities and one of the largest prison operators in the United States, behind only the federal government and three states. We currently operate 65 facilities, including 44 company-owned facilities, with a total design capacity of approximately 87,000 beds in 19 states and the District of Columbia. We specialize in owning, operating and managing prisons and other correctional facilities and providing inmate residential and prisoner transportation services for governmental agencies. In addition to providing the fundamental residential services relating to inmates, our facilities offer a variety of rehabilitation and educational programs, including basic education, religious services, life skills and employment training and substance abuse treatment. These services are intended to reduce recidivism and to prepare inmates for their successful re-entry into society upon their release. We also provide health care (including medical, dental and psychiatric services), food services and work and recreational programs.
